To Mr & Mrs Duckane

Dear Sir & Madame

It is with a feeling of regret & sincere sympathy that I ask the late Lieutenant's sorrowing Mother & Father to accept my sympathy. I very much regret your loss (as well as the loss of our King & country) at the sudden & untimely "but brave & glorious" death "on the battlefield" of so promising an officer & comrade as your only dear son Lieutenant Duckane. I also regret that I can give you no information as to his last moments only he was too game & went on in front shouting to his men to come on, all at once word was passed along the line that Lieutenant Duckane was down, but there was a lot of short stubby bushes, which was tearing our clothes & hands & the fighting was simply ~~a~~ful "as you already know": I have been inquiring from any of the old 1st Batt but there are so few of the original 1st here that it is hard to find out anything about him. One man here who was wounded told me he was shot stone dead & never moved & it is a blessing if he never suffered

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I had my two best mates killed the same way
they hardly moved. I got nine that morning
also, but it only cut my scalp on the top of
my head & I went on for nineteen weeks & got
nocked at lone Pine with a shrapnell bullet
which broke my thigh. Yes I thoroughly
understand the feelings of Mr. Dusckone &
yourself in connection with your son as I
can see the havock that the anxiety of my
wounds (& also the wounds of my brother)
has done with my own dear parents &c
yes sir its a terrible time & when one looks
around Sydney & goes to sports & see the big
bulking shirkers in thousands, well its
simply deplorable. Yes indeed Mr. Dusckone
your late son was very popular with his men
for when he was removed from my old coy. S-at
Hensington we got up a petition to keep him
in our coy & needlers to say my name was one
of the first on the list but he told us we had
better not put it in, as the military law
is strict & he'd better go into another coy if
they told him to. I am sorry I can give you no
more information & hope that Mr. Dusckone & yourself
will bear up & consider what an immortal name

Your late son has helped to win for our country & for you
& that God in his mercy will help you to bear up our troubles
